THE DEATH OF FIDEL CASTRO in November came long after he had faded from the political stage. The regime he leaves behind is a creaking and repressive relic of Cold War communism. Yet for many Cubans and fellow travelers throughout the hemisphere, Fidelismo still symbolizes a glorious struggle for egalitarian revolutionary ideals and resistance against US imperialism. Unfortunately, a latter-day attempt to emulate that legacy has led Venezuela into chaos. Elsewhere in Latin America, while political and economic inequalities remain pervasive, reform of democratic institutions is increasingly seen as a more effective response than armed revolt.
